MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear friends all over the world,

Our Annual Report 2023 is presented to you here with great pride and pleasure. We invite you to read through our numerous and diverse activities which aim at contributing to a more peaceful, just, and sustainable world.

Numerous research institutions focus their studies on identifying significant interconnected polycrises that our world is encountering. The sheer number of ongoing challenges include conflicts, climate change, health issues in fragile communities, financial inclusion of all peoples (especially the most vulnerable ones), education, and civic engagement.

Many scholars wonder whether our global "new normal" is a return to basics such as food, energy, security, the most fundamental human rights that our globalised world was supposed to be on a good path to offer solutions.

More than 32 countries were involved in armed conflicts in 2023 including the most prominent ones between Russia-Ukraine, and Israel-Palestine, but also in Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Iraq, Yemen, Syria, Somalia, Libya, the Central African Republic, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Myanmar, Colombia, and Mali. The arms race expenditure, which reached the amount of \$2,443 trillion in 2023, could have been well spent instead for the sustainable development of the communities.

Human values on peace and non-conflict came out of the ashes of the different geopolitical tensions, where millions of people paid with their lives in the past. Humanity is currently watching in devastation the genocide (according to Special Procedures of the UN Human Rights Council) of the Palestinian people. We cannot help but ask if we're going back to those barbarous times.

SCI as a Civil Society Organization is committed unwaveringly to working collectively, to further our impact and to ensure that the efforts of our volunteers contribute meaningfully to our mission for peace and non-violence as well as to a sustainable future. Furthermore SCI, abiding with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, organised projects on raising awareness in climate and social justice, promoted healthy lifestyles and wellbeing, worked against inequalities by promoting peaceful and inclusive societies.

In addition, we take pride in the fact that, amidst increased violence and disregard for human rights globally, our projects and activities are aimed at supporting initiatives which promote peace and understanding while maintaining high quality educational and lifelong learning standards. Our newly introduced impact measurement tool aims to be able to manifest that our projects make a positive impact in our volunteers and the communities we work with through time.

Our flagship project of the year, "No War Anywhere," allowed us to reconnect with our antimilitarist roots and reinforce our dedication to peace. Born from the need to counter the rising trend of global militarisation, accelerated by the full-scale war in Ukraine, it fostered a community of young activists engaged in local and international peace-building activities. These individuals now possess the knowledge and skills to advocate for a world-view where positive peace prevails. The project's significance was further underscored as military violence escalated in Gaza, leading to subsequent activities focusing on the situation in Palestine and extending support to our Palestinian partners. One highlight is the inception of "Talks Against War," a series of online events, which is still ongoing.

Recognising the paramount importance of solidarity within our movement during times of crisis, we were once again reminded of the invaluable contribution of volunteering, and the international volunteering service in particular. To fortify our movement and enhance our volunteer exchange practices, numerous projects and meetings facilitated the exchange of best practices and capacity-building initiatives.

With the completion of the project Grassroots Change, we launched an online training course to support preparation of volunteer exchanges between Africa and Europe.
The annual Placement Officer Training was
conducted to equip our volunteers with the
skills necessary for efficiently managing volunteer applications, and an online Exchange
Platform Meeting took place allowing organisations to discuss how to improve our international projects and cooperation.

Another increasingly pertinent topic for SCI is that of climate justice, and our international climate team has been actively advocating for this cause within the movement. Participation in COP28 in Dubai, the creation of a Climate Manifesto, and the successful application for a climate activism project scheduled for 2024 are notable achievements of the team.

This year marked the inception of our "Partnership in Peace" program, supported by the CERV structural grant, enabling us to implement ambitious changes. Initiatives included the modernisation of our placement system, piloting an impact measurement process as mentioned above, and supporting many EU branches' projects through a regranting scheme.

Furthermore, we had the opportunity to convene in person for our International Committee Meeting, marking our first in-person ICM gathering post-COVID. This served as an ideal platform to conclude our Strategic Plan cycle for 2020-2023 and collaboratively finalise our new Strategic Plan 2024-2027, ensuring that we keep evolving to meet the needs of the present.


I would also like to mention here that, after numerous personal meetings and discussions with most of the organisations below, we proudly welcomed during our December ICM the upgrade of Voluntary Workcamps Association of Nigeria (VWAN) from Group to Branch, the upgrade of Zimbabwe Workcamp Association (ZWA) from Partner to Group, the upgrade of The Space for Sustainable Development (SSD) from Jordan from Contact to Partner, the return of Kenya Voluntary Development Association (KVDA) to SCI as a contact organisation, as well as the introduction of WeCollab from Colombia, Society for Peace and Sustainable Development (SPSD) from Pakistan, and World Solidarity Voluntary Organization (WOSOVO) from Ghana as contact organisations.

I could not end this note without highlighting and acknowledging the dedicated contributions of our global movement of branches, working groups, partners, and volunteers, coming from every corner of this world and from every area of life. They all worked for the interest of the local communities in an effort to make a positive change to this world. I thank you all wholeheartedly for your altruistic engagement with the SCI family while embracing its values and for inspiring us all in the International Executive Committee. I would also like to extend our appreciation to our donors for their support to our projects and to the functioning of our international structure.

Motivated by our collective achievements, we are resolute in continuing our mission for peace with a forward-looking strategy. I would like to assure you that we are determined to reinforce international volunteering as a powerful tool for advancing antimilitarism, climate justice, inclusion, and solidarity.



THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE MEETING

All branches come together twice a year in the International Committee Meeting to make common decisions.

This year's International Committee Meetings happened on 17 June online to discuss financial matters, and from 6 to 10 December in Vienna, Austria. In December's meeting, branches voted to welcome new partners and branches, approved our working groups in SCI and made recommendations to strengthen regional working groups, adopted the SCI Child Safeguarding Policy, planned to collaborate in strengthening internal education on Israel and Palestine and agreed to join ICAN. Other urgent resolutions aimed at improving and simplifying our internal processes. Important documents were also approved, namely the Strategic Plan 2024-2027, Plan of Action 2024 and International budget 2024.



THE INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Our international movement is guided by the International Executive Committee, which makes sure that decisions taken by branches at the International Committee Meetings are implemented throughout the year.

In 2023 the International Executive Committee was composed of the following members: Alexandra Vasileiou (International President), Silvio Martinelli (International Vice-President), Nico Verzijden (International Treasurer), Antonios Sifakis, Bert Verstappen, Femi Aganran, Alena Lemisev (members). Dr. Shobha Rani joined as a co-opted member.


OUR VOLUNTEERING PROJECTS

Each year, SCI organises international voluntary projects for people of all ages and backgrounds to promote a culture of peace.

In 2023, a total of 201 camps took place. Camps lasted an average of 13 days.



Workcamps focussed on **different themes**, many centering their activities on environment protection, children and youth, and art, culture and local history.



In 2023, 821 volunteers participated in SCI workcamps and 324 volunteers participated in long-term volunteering or special programmes, for **a total of 1145 volunteers** participating in SCI projects.






OUR CAPACITY-BUILDING PROJECTS

NO WAR ANYWHERE! ENGAGING YOUTH IN ANTIMILITARIST EDU-CATION

No War Anywherel Engaging youth in antimilitarist education was an annual work plan co-funded by the European Youth Foundation of the Council of Europe and CERV. It addressed urgent and important questions such as antimilitarist utopias, nuclear disarmament, military-industrial complex, and offered young people the space and tools to stand up for peace. The project involved 15 partner organisations located in Albania, Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, United Kingdom, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Kosovo, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Spain, Switzerland, Spain.

The idea

The project aimed at bringing together young people from different European realities to exchange on the topic of antimilitarism and to get active together.

After exploring alternatives to militarism and map possibilities for antimilitarist action, the project aimed to create spaces for young people to discuss, exchange, and organise grassroots peace campaigns, particularly on International Peace Day 2023. To carry the goals further, the project created an open and accessible online learning course on communication, advocacy, and campaigning for peace, and strengthened cooperation with other antimilitarist networks.



The activities

No War Anywhere consisted of 6 components: two in-person activities, local campaigns, an event for International day of peace, a virtual exchange and an online course.

Seminar "Utopias Against War"

In April 2023 a one-week international seminar was held in Italy with the participation of 22 young people. The seminar focused on learning and brainstorming about antimilitarist futures, what local and network-wide actions can be taken to strengthen antimilitarism and peace.

We got to know each other as future activists with the background of militarism and created a web of people that could help each other in the future.

Training "Strategies Against War"

In June-July 24 young people gathered in Vienna for an advocacy and communication training. It allowed participants to know more about advocacy around the topic of peace and antimilitarism and to initiate their local peace campaigns.

Communication campaigns

Between July and December 2023, participants in the previous activities organised communication and advocacy campaigns for peace, in their own countries and online. The aim was to advocate for change and to bring visibility to antimilitarism and its effects and consequences. Six activities were organised in Switzerland, Hungary, Greece, Serbia and online reaching around 200 people in total.

Virtual exchange and No More War Working Group

A virtual exchange took place in September, involving all those interested in continuing the antimilitarist work in SCI. The two-day meeting allowed participants to grasp the project's current status and draw connections between the past, present, and future of SCI to develop a concrete plan for continued action on antimilitarism. This initiated the creation of a renewed "No More War" working group in SCI.



Online advocacy and communication course

Towards the end of 2023, the online course "Speak up for Peace" was created. It is a free, self-paced, interactive course on advocacy and communication, available to the public on our online learning platform learning.sci.ngo. Participants in previous activities contributed to the testing phase. This course was promoted on social media throughout the course of a month, leading to the launch.

NO WAR ANYWHERE: COMMUNICATION CAMPAIGNS


The many ways of peace and antimilitarism

Online, 21 September 2023

For International Peace Day, 21 September, 2023, SCI held an online discussion on the many ways of peace & antimilitarism. This was a space for guest speakers from different regions, namely Palestine, Ukraine, Ireland, and the No War Anywhere project team, to share their experiences and discuss grassroots efforts for peace. 54 people attended, including speakers, out of the 82 people who registered. After the guest speakers' presentations, a fruitful discussion around peace continued in breakout rooms. The event was recorded then edited for our Youtube and social media channels.

All the different issues that we are working on, like peace, human rights protection, LGBT issues, climate change, gender equality are very important and inter-connected. Peace Work in Palestine

Switzerland, 21 September 2023

Members of SCI Switzerland and members of Tent of Nations, a Palestinian partner organisation of SCI, organised an event for International Day of Peace to draw attention to the situation in Palestine. During this event 2 speakers – Daoud Nassar from Tent of Nations (by Zoom) and Tamara Gerber from Peace Watch Switzerland – related their experiences in Palestine,



the daily struggles, conflicts, and efforts to create dialogue, peace and anti-militarism on the ground. Daoud showed the example of the family Nassar from the project "Tent of Nations" and Tamara shared her experience of a few months in Palestine as a human rights observer. They engaged with the audience on questions related to peace work in a conflict area: how is peace work possible in such a conflict zone? What does it mean for activists? How do they find their strength to go on? What can be achieved? 12 people participated in the event.

PeaceBox - Peace up!

Hungary, October-Novembre 2023

PeaceBox was an art-driven campaign engaging young and socially disadvantaged individuals. The campaign consisted of 5 workshops aimed at promoting positive messages of peace through various art forms, providing a platform for creative expression to transcend language and cultural differences.

Object Militarism

Greece, September - November 2023

In Greece, SCI Hellas led a two-month campaign to promote civic service as an alternative to mandatory military service for male Greek citizens. The comprehensive campaign included multimedia components such as video and audio spots in Greek, a multilingual web platform featuring interviews and antimilitarist materials, a podcast interview of a conscientious objector (Lazaros Petromelidis), and a public networking event. The latter provided an opportunity for young people to learn about the alternative service, connect with those who had experienced it, and engage with legal experts on conscientious objection. Concluding the campaign was a poignant documentary, encapsulating the history, concept, and practice of conscientious objectors, spanning from the foundation of SCI by Pierre Ceresole to contemporary actions taken on national and EU levels due to the war in Ukraine.



Palestinian Film Cycle

Serbia, November 2023

VCV Serbia organised a series of cultural events in support of the Palestinian cause, featuring movie screenings and a reading event. The films included "Little Palestine, Diary of a Siege" (2021), "Sarura - The Future is an Unknown Place" (2020), and "Gaza Surf Club" (2016), accompanied by a reading of "The Gaza Monologues" in Serbian and English. Each event drew approximately 20 attendees, with the final event being held on the International Day of Support for the Palestinian people.

Talks Against War

Online, December 2023

The No More War international team started a new monthly series of online talks called "Talks Against War". Talks Against War #1 focused on pinkwashing in a war, when the Israeli army used a rainbow flag during the assault on Gaza and the false justifications linking the assault to LGBTQ+ issues. The speakers, Maria Sham and Udi Raz, discussed the intersection of queerness, the fight against war, and Palestinian liberation.

GRASSROOTS CHANGE: VOLUNTEERING, LEADERSHIP AND EMANCIPA-TION THROUGH HANDS-ON WORK AND MENTORING

The idea



The Grassroots Change project was a 2-year project funded by the Erasmus+ program of the European Union. It aimed to improve the quality of short- and long-term voluntary projects in the defined Sub-Saharan African and European countries by investing in leadership and mentoring training courses for the youth organisations involved as well as by creating tools for the sending and hosting organisations. The final goal of the project was to create grassroots change in the communities of each organisation, paying special attention to global

challenges and focussing on the gender perspective, climate justice and decolonisation. The project started in late 2020 and ended in May 2023; it was coordinated by SCI Catalunya while the International Secretariat of SCI was a project partner, together with SCI Italia (Italy), KVT Finland (Finland), VWAN Nigeria (Nigeria), AJOV (Mozambique), SAVWA (South Africa), and ZWA (Zimbabwe).

The activities

Main activities of the project in 2021 and 2022 were a mapping exercise, a webinar "Decolonise volunteering: dream or reality?", an African Regional Training in Zimbabwe, a European Regional Training in Italy, Job Shadowing, First Steering team meeting in Mozambique combined with an LTV Mentors Training, and a Training of Trainers for Camp Leaders in Catalonia (Spain). In 2023 there was a second Steering team meeting in Catalonia (Spain) and the publication of different outputs.

In February, key representatives from each of the partner organisations of the project met for 6 days in Barcelona, Catalunya (Spain) to evaluate the activities and outcomes delivered by the overall project. The Steering Team meeting was combined with a production lab to final-

ise the production of the project tools and documents on volunteer exchanges. At the same time, the partners involved participated in the first steps of the creation of a MOOC (massive open online course) about exchanges between Europe and Africa (both sides). This in-person meeting was an opportunity to strengthen relations and trust between African and European countries.



PLACEMENT OFFICER TRAINING

31 international participants took part in the SCI Placement Officer Training (POT) in Switzerland, for one week in February 2023. Volunteers or staff in SCI who place (other) volunteers in workcamps got to know all the practical procedures, the online database, tips, tricks, possible challenges, and good practices around that – as well as to get a better understanding of SCI as a movement and the possibilities of getting active in it and making it more inclusive.



EXCHANGE PLATFORM MEETING

SCI's annual meeting to evaluate and improve volunteer exchanges, the Exchange Platform



Meeting (EPM), was held online from 9 to 17 October. 2023 EPM, happening in the European Year of Skills, was focussed on skills and capacity building. SCI activists, branches, groups, partners and contacts came together for the event, with an average of 16.6 participants per session. The agenda for this year encompassed a wide array of topics, including a review of the previous year's achievements and challenges, updates on

key projects, follow-up decisions from EPM 2022 and EPM 2019, informative workshops and training sessions, and an exploration of future goals and initiatives.

COP-28 PARTICIPATION

The 2023 United Nations Climate Change Conference, also referred to as COP28, took place in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, between November 30 to December 13, 2023. SCI has observer status with the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, so we could send a delegation of 5 young climate activists from Pakistan, Bangladesh/Germany, UK/Singapore, and Nepal, and allow 5 more people to participate online from Spain, Palestine, Switzerland, UK and Ireland. The participants were either SCI activists or selected in cooperation with the Youth Constituency of the UNFCCC (YOUNGO). This allowed us to support activists from the least represented geographical regions to push for their own agenda at the conference, as a small step for increased climate justice.

Youth like us face challenges when working and engaging in the fight for climate justice.

Nevertheless, there are organisations like SCI that are dedicated to supporting young individuals, and significantly ease our path in this collective struggle.

PARTNERSHIP ON PEACE: REGRANTING PROJECTS

For the first time in 2023, in the scope of SCI's Operating Grant under CERV, the International Secretariat of SCI invited proposals from its member organisations based in EU member states, for projects to be supported throughout the year. The aim of the Re-granting Scheme is to financially support network branches to carry out activities which promote the core values of SCI and the values of the European Union (EU). In 2023, 10 projects were submitted and 5 selected.

VOLUNTEERING FOR PEACE



SCI Poland

SCI Poland organised a 7-month project working on building knowledge and skills for peace-building among Polish elementary and high school students, as well as their teachers. They organised events and trainings, an information campaign and an awareness-raising activity. Participants in the two four-day training programs, "Educators for Peace. Peace in Practice", used their new knowledge by conducting workshops in schools and other educational institutions, spreading peaceful values among young people. Thus, 21 dedicated volunteers led a series of 44 workshops across 14 schools and institutions, reaching a total of 924 participants. Educational materials focussed on the three pillars of peace were also created and made accessible to the public.

EU FOR ALL

SCI Hellas

SCI Hellas organised a 8-month project with the goal of building knowledge on how human rights work, what EU rights and values are and how important their promotion and protection is. Their participant target group was children from refugee and asylum-seeking communities in Athens.

After a survey concerning the European Union values and rights was sent out to understand what the knowledge of the participants was, tailored workshops were implemented. Children learn about human rights and their history, with each workshop focussing on one particular right and using non-formal education methods. Afterwards, supported by experts, the children created a series of podcasts sharing their experiences and knowledge. The children, after this experience, are able to explore their own series of podcasts, finding new topics with



SCI Hellas' support and even bring more people in and create their own activity for other children. A final event brought everyone together to the podcasts and exchange views on the project. The project involved 102 children: 80 in the workshops and 22 in the podcasts.

LOCAL RE-ACTIVATION: 75 YEARS OF SCI ITALY ACTIVISM

SCI Italy



SCI Italy organised a 6-month project aimed at re-activating the grassroots movement of SCI Italy by strengthening the engagement and value of local and regional groups of activists. The pandemic had significantly impacted participation in local volunteering, so the project focused on supporting the implementation of local activities with geographical barriers and strengthening the cooperation among the local groups, the board and the national secretariat. Several activities were organised by the local groups as part of this initiative, such as a training, a minicamp, a workcamp, which attracted new young volunteers and established new local partnerships. In addition, a national event celebrating SCI Italy's 75th Anniversary was organised, raising awareness about the organisation's history, evolution, and impact over the years. The program boasted an impressive participation of 105 individuals, exceeding initial expectations, and significantly bolstered organisational capabilities within local groups.

SOLIDARITY PROJECT

CVS Bulgaria

CVS Bulgaria organised a 7-month project aimed at providing volunteer support to asylum seekers, refugees, holders of temporary protection and migrants. The objective was to engage local and international volunteers to collaborate with different stakeholders (local and international non-profit organisations, State agency for refugees staff, businesses and others) towards the integration of the target group in Bulgarian



society and to facilitate the welcoming process and acceptance of the new-comers in the local community. They organised educational, recreational and sport activities and outings for children, unaccompanied minors and adults, as well as psychological support within individual and group sessions. Considering integration a double sided process, they also worked with the local communities organising different awareness raising events and community building celebrations. Within the project, a summer workcamp "Solidarity Volunteering academy" was also organised. The project reached 713 people in total.

LEARNING FROM HISTORY! MEMORIAL CAMPS IN TIMES OF WAR


SCI Germany

SCI Germany organised a 7-month project consisting of seven study camps in collaboration with memorials and antifascist organisations. Each camp had a work component and a study component, focusing on the history of National Socialism, right-wing extremism, and antifascism today. The seven study camps facilitated an increase in knowledge among the participants regarding the topics of remembrance and the nurturing of international dialogue among participants. In addition, the work projects played a pivotal role in preserving memorials, expanding their facilities and creating new material, advocating for tolerance, and actively combating right-wing extremism within their communities and beyond. Two short programmes were also made for television, and one photo exhibition was organised.

The project reached a total of 124 participants,

with 88 workcamp participants (of which 11 camp coordinators) and 36 participants in the dissemination seminar.





RESOURCES AND TOOLS

SPEAK UP FOR PEACE

Created in the context of the project "No War Anywhere", the online course "Speak up for Peace" is a free, self-paced, interactive course on advocacy and communication for peace. It comprises three modules: General communication concepts, Advocacy for peace, and Working together, and is directed at SCI communication officers, activists and anyone who wants to speak up for peace!




MOOC: PREPARE YOURSELF FOR CROSS-CULTURAL VOLUNTEERING!



This online course focuses on exchanges between Europe and Africa (both ways), with the objective to prepare those who want to go from Europe to Africa and from Africa to Europe for a volunteering experience by giving them some food for thought. Without expecting to give volunteers all the answers to their questions, it aims to start a reflection on important concepts like voluntourism, white saviour mentality, culture shock, expectations, prejudices, stereotypes.

CLIMATE GUIDELINES FOR VOLUNTEER PROJECTS

This toolkit is an output of the project Grassroots change and is based on the conviction that climate change is for us today what World War I was to Pierre Cérésole, the founder of SCI in the early XX century: a growing threat to peace, nonviolence and human rights. The toolkit is meant to map existing resources, and educate on the climate crisis in order to lower the impact of our activities on the environment.



DETOX YOUR PROJECT

The booklet, created by SCI Madrid as an outcome of the training by the same name, contains information about gender and discrimination, an introduction to masculinities and guidelines on how to deal with toxic masculinities on a daily basis as well as in our organisations.



FACILITATOR'S CARDS



Facilitator's Cardshelp facilitators, trainers, educators plan and implement an educational activity. These cards support users with ideas, checklists, and spaces for notes and reminders so that everyone can deliver a high-quality learning process. They are accompanied by a supplement that gives additional, theoretical insights into the card topics. The tool was created by SCI Poland as part of the project "Learning Lab(oratory) – quality non-education in the digital world".
